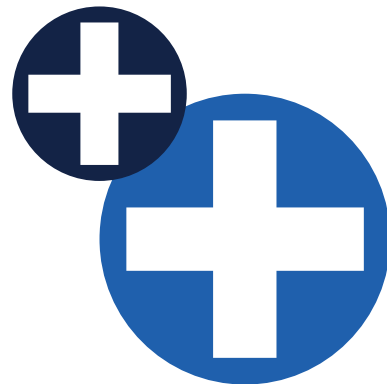
**Research for the Future** is an NHS-supported campaign that helps people find out about, and take part in health research.

We offer research opportunities across all health conditions as well as for healthy volunteers.

## Why we need research

Research to find better care and treatment has always been at the heart of the NHS. By carrying out research in to what works, we are able to discover new ways to prevent, diagnose and manage illnesses. It also allows the NHS to improve services and focus resources where they are most effective.

The medicines and treatments we use today are only available thanks to people volunteering to take part in research studies in the past.



## What happens next

Research for the Future helps researchers find suitable people to take part in their studies. We match people using the information provided at registration.

When suitable opportunities arise, we will contact you to let you know what the research is about, where it is taking place, what is involved and how you can take part.

It is always your decision whether to take part in any research we tell you about. The usual care you receive from your healthcare team will never be affected by your decision.

## Taking part in research

We offer a wide range of research for you to take part in. These include patient and public involvement and engagement (PPIE) activities, questionnaires, discussion groups and trials of new treatments.

Some research studies have very specific requirements, for example, they may be looking for people with a particular medical history or who take certain medications. Other research opportunities such as discussion groups may only need a few people. This means not everyone who volunteers for a study will be able to take part.
